vi was turning 30. As yet unmarried, he resented how each new birthday seemed to provoke new waves of pity and concern among his friends and relatives. The last thing he wanted was to publicize the fact that he was hitting the Big Three-Oh. Therefore he told his family and friends, "No party! Absolutely no party!"

Zev, Avi's long-time friend and neighbor, thought Avi was just putting on a show of humility. "Of course he wants his friends to celebrate his milestone birthday with him!" Zev thought. He planned a big surprise party for Avi at his favorite restaurant, and swore all their friends to secrecy.

When Avi walked into his party, thinking he was joining a different friend for dinner, the shouts of "Surprise!" and "Happy Birthday!" turned him pale with anger. Realizing that he had to rise to the occasion, he swallowed his pain and did his best

to smile through the night. Afterwards his brother told him, "I saw the look on your face when you walked it. You were furious. I told Zev not to do this, but he thought you were just trying to be modest."

Zev only wanted to do something nice for Avi. Did Avi's brother speak *rechilus* when he disclosed who planned the party?

HALACHAH

here are three factors that might seem to indicate that this is not rechilus: First. Zev didn't think he had done anything wrong; secondly, Avi's brother knew Zev was not trying to harm Avi; and thirdly, if Avi had asked Zev if he planned the party, Zev would have readily admitted it, since he didn't feel he had done anything wrong. However, even with all these factors in play, Avi's brother spoke rechilus, because he stirred Avi's animosity against Zev.



andy worked in an office with Gloria,* who was Jewish but lived a secular lifestyle. In fact, Gloria had almost no knowledge of Judaism; she was even married to a non-Jewish man.

Meanwhile, in the Torah world, a new brand of learning was arriving on the scene. The Chofetz Chaim: A Lesson a Day provided, for the first time, daily lessons in the *halachos* and *hashkafos* of shmiras haloshon, adapted from the works of the Chofetz Chaim and following the Shmiras Haloshon Yomi calendar of the Manchester Rosh Yeshivah.

The goal of the book was to involve vast new swaths of Klal Yisrael in this life-changing learning. More people would have access to the Torah's wisdom on speech and human relationships. More Jews would come to understand the power of the mitzvah to increase their personal happiness and bring Klal Yisrael closer to redemption. People began picking up the book and learning it in groups or with partners.

Among those people was Sandy, and the partner she invited to learn with her was Gloria. For some reason, despite her disconnection from Torah, Gloria agreed. As the learning progressed, Gloria made an eye-opening discovery: The Torah is in perfect sync with human emotions and relationships. It is so respectful of the human heart that it provides detailed guidance on how to speak to and about each other.



THE INVISIBLE 'POISON' WARNING

When we know what it is, we know what to do.



He bought the insecticide, and after using it, stored it on a high shelf in the basement. The next day his little boy Chaim climbed up on a chair and then on the washing machine, and reached up to the shelf. He grabbed the spray bottle, climbed down, and ran upstairs to his mother, who was in the kitchen preparing dinner.

"Look what I found!" he exclaimed, as he worked to get the trigger moving.

What would his mother do? Would she say nothing so as not to hamper Chaim's selfexpression? Would she worry that stopping him might insult him? She would grab it out of his hand!

What about when the danger is spiritual? Loshon hora and ona'as devarim—hurtful words—are spiritual poisons. When we recognize them for what they are, we act ASAP to keep them out.

There are ways to do this without accusing or condescending. For instance, you can say, "I'm working on my shmiras haloshon. Can you help me out?" It may be a little awkward in the beginning, but it soon becomes natural.
